Summary of the Work:

A ninth grader's antipathy to his English teacher leads him into a school protest involving the National Anthem. The situation escalates when school personnel, his parents, and the national media become involved. Through documentations of letters, memos, phone calls, newspaper stories, and diaries, the opinions and agendas of different individuals become known. In the end, many lives are destroyed and the truth obliterated because of the failure of individuals to communicate and reason with one another.

(The best way to evaluate and understand a novel is to personally read the book in its entirety.)

Nothing But the Truth tackles the ideas of honesty and misrepresentation of the truth. It contains mild expletives. The text promotes excellent discussion of the importance of honesty.

Rationale:

Nothing But the Truth is written in a documentary-style, thereby offering a peek into the psyches of numerous characters. Each event, beginning with the seemingly simple act of rebellion of the protagonist, Philip, leads to a complication and into a string of cause-effect relationships that catapult all characters into crisis and alter many lives. The reader will learn the internal and external conflicts of the protagonist, Phillip, but they are also privy to conflicts afflicting a series of other characters. This novel is an excellent way to teach students how to identify conflict and analyze its causes and results. Characters in this novel jump to conclusions without exploring the truth. The media is the most grievous in pursuing innuendo and half-truths, opening the door to in-depth discussions about the role media play in our very real world.
