Summary of the Work:

Fifth century Britain is a country divided and in chaos after the Roman withdrawal. Myridden Emrys—or as he would become known, Merlin—is the bastard son of a Welsh princess and Aurelius Ambrosius, the future king of Britain. The novel traces Merlin's perilous journey from childhood to his position as trusted advisor of Abrosius. Merlin's gift of "the sight" and his quest for knowledge give him the wisdom to help Ambrosius conquer Britain and vanquish innumerable foes. It is Merlin's ultimate destiny to protect and advise the greatest king of Britain, King Arthur.

Rationale:

Students who read *The Crystal Cave* will understand the historical and mythological background for the Arthurian legend. Merlin's transformation from brash young teen to wise advisor to kings offers many lessons for teens. It is Merlin's willingness to sacrifice his personal desires for the greater good of Britain and his constant quest for knowledge that allows for destiny to be realized through the birth of King Arthur. His life follows the classic hero's journey pattern, a pattern that freshmen use as a lens to analyze literature.
