# **Summary of the Work:**

A coming of age tale for young adults set in the trenches of the Vietnam War in the late 1960s, *Fallen Angels* is the story of Ritchie Perry, a Harlem teenager who volunteers for the army when his dream of attending college falls through. Sent to the front lines, Perry and his platoon come face-to-face with the Vietcong and the real horrors of warfare. But violence and death aren't the only hardships. As Perry struggles to find virtue in himself and his fellow soldiers, he confronts blatant racism and wonders why the U.S. is there at all.

#### Rationale:

Like many teens today, the narrator and main character, Richard "Richie" Perry, is unprepared for what awaits him after high school. Like teens, too, Richie is unhappy at home and is looking for a chance to make a way for himself. Through his experiences, the young reader can relate as Richie begins to mature and become less egocentric. As Richie's innocence disappears, he learns to accept greater responsibility.

Themes explored in this book include; coming of age, accepting personal responsibility, coping with fear and loss, and the formation of a moral conscience.
