Beartown deals with important, but occasionally disturbing, issues that arise in adolescent life. The issue of rape, substance abuse, and peer pressure. However, all these sensitive topics are dealt with and processed through in a positive, constructive manner.

Rationale:

Beartown is an ideal choice for the 12th grade curriculum because it tells the story of characters of similar age and experiences students could find themselves facing after they leave high school. As a novel, it allows students to discuss and understand complex issues from an objective point of view. If further allows students to become more sensitive to situations others might be going through. Positive outlets for dealing with stress, depression, and anger are examined, as well as the issue of peer pressure and when to speak up. Through examining fictional characters, students can openly discuss the hardships many of our youth face. This open conversation ultimately leads to a better understanding and more proactive problem-solving skills.
