It's the kind of positive energy that fueled our Capital High Bruins on their journey to the state AA Basketball Tournament in Billings. After winning yesterday's quarterfinals game against Gallatin High School (Bozeman), the team returns to the court tonight to play Billings Skyview in the semi-finals. Way to represent, Bruins! The Bruin basketball Team is not there alone. Our student athletes include our dazzling dance and cheer teams as well. Congratulations are also in order for the Helena High Mock Trial Team, which won a 3-peat state championship on Saturday, defeating Flathead High School (Kalispell). We know they are competitors to be reckoned with in this rigorous national competition, in which students demonstrate their knowledge of our legal system by playing the roles of attorneys, witnesses, and others involved in the workings of a trial.

At the middle school level, CR Anderson Principal Dave Thennis, has accepted a position as superintendent of the Stevensville School District starting next school year. It's gratifying to see Mr. Thennis take this exciting new step in his career and we wish him and his family much success.

While we are sad to see them go, we wish each of these veteran educators the best in their next chapters. We have some big shoes to fill. Mr. Chancy, Ms. Lowney, and Mr. Thennis have a combined 96 years of experience with Helena Public Schools. The district is conducting a rigorous recruitment process and we will continue to keep our community informed as finalists are vetted and announced.
