There is still much to look forward to as we start the last full month of the school year.

Today and tomorrow, some of Montana's most talented young musicians are gathered in Helena for the western division of the MHSA State Solo and Ensemble Music Festival at Helena High and Helena Middle School. Serving as a school board trustee is no small commitment. Our trustees are true community servants, giving their time for many hours of meetings, events, and study at home. As the name implies, they are trusted stewards of one of our community's most precious resources. Please join us in supporting Kay, Lois, and Siobhan as they take on, or recommit to, this important civic responsibility.

We'll also say farewell on the 17th to Trustees Libby Goldes and John McEwen. We are tremendously grateful to Libby and John for their dedicated service to our school district and our community, during

which they have each served in multiple leadership roles. Libby served a total of 15 years as a trustee, including as chair of the Board and of various committees. We wish them both well in their future endeavors as leaders in our community.

We're also grateful to our Student Representatives to the Board, Eliza Lay, of Capital High, and Rylie Schoenfeld, of Helena High, for their leadership on behalf of their peers. Both Eliza and Rylie were engaged, thoughtful, and professional participants in Board discussions and we know they will continue to be leaders in their colleges and communities.

Finally, I would like to share some important changes to school lunches. Over the course of the COVID-19 Pandemic, the District's Food Services team served more than 2 million breakfasts and lunches to our community's children – free of charge – with funding from the US Department of Agriculture.

As we return to a normal school environment, that federal funding is ending. This means three things for our district families as we return to pre-pandemic meal policies:

- Beginning with the fall 2022-23 school year, students who are not qualified to receive Free and Reduced Lunch must pay the regular price for meals.
- To qualify for the Free and Reduced Lunch Program next school year, families must fill out a 2022-23 Free and Reduced Lunch application or be "direct certified" via participation in a federal program such as SNAP or as a foster family. <u>Please visit our Food Services page</u> on our website to find out if your family already qualifies or to apply.
- The <u>"Munchtana" food truck</u> will provide free meals in the parks again this summer, but with some changes. Children must be present to receive meals and food must be eaten on site (weekly take-home meals will no longer be provided.)

We want every one of our students to have the nutrition they need to learn and thrive at school. If you qualify and would like your child to participate in the Free and Reduced Lunch Program next year, please fill out an application form as soon as possible.

Finally, I am pleased to share the results of the 2022 Vigilante Parade! Congratulations to the winners and all who participated today. And thank you to our community for coming out to cheer on our Bengals and Bruins!
