I. CALL TO ORDER/INTRODUCTIONS

The meeting was called to order at 12:01 p.m. by Trustee Jenny Murnane Butcher.

II. GENERAL PUBLIC COMMENT

There was no general public comment.

III. REVIEW OF AGENDA

No changes were requested to the agenda.

IV. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

The committee reviewed and accepted the minutes from the April 22, 2026, Teaching and Learning Committee Meeting.

V. ITEMS FOR INFORMATION/DISCUSSION

A. Advanced Report Responses

The Committee reviewed the District's responses and planned actions related to recommendations from Dr. Plucker's Advanced Learning Report. Administration discussed current practices and next steps related to differentiation, acceleration, advanced coursework, PEAK services, professional development, and the identification and screening of advanced learners. Plans for the upcoming school year include a differentiation audit, continued Universal Design for Learning training, increased involvement of PEAK specialists in building-level PLCs, and additional support for teachers in providing enrichment and acceleration opportunities. Administration discussed current practices for using student data to identify students who may benefit from accelerated or advanced coursework, while continuing conversations with students and families regarding placement. The District will also adjust the PEAK high school service model to provide periodic project and engagement opportunities while allowing specialists to increase support at the elementary and middle school levels.

The Committee also reviewed updates to the referral and universal screening process. Administration discussed the pilot of the Naglieri assessment and plans to explore local norms as another tool for identifying students who may otherwise be overlooked. The updated referral process incorporates additional teacher and parent input and greater involvement from school-based teams. Trustees discussed opportunities to provide advanced instruction within students' home schools, the importance of maintaining grade-level rigor while providing acceleration, and the staffing and resources necessary to provide differentiated instruction. The Committee also discussed continued training and support for teachers and paraprofessionals. Trustees expressed interest in monitoring implementation of the report recommendations and the impact of expanded identification practices on PEAK services and staffing. Dr. Alberts addressed questions from the Teaching and Learning Committee regarding the information presented.

B. End-of-Year Academic Data

The Committee reviewed end-of-year academic data for early learning, elementary, middle school, and high school students. Administration reported that 76% of KinderSprouts participants were entering kindergarten at or above benchmark, with parent survey results reflecting positive experiences with the program. Kindergarten and elementary reading proficiency remained generally steady, and administration highlighted positive student growth associated with the implementation of UFLI. The District plans to expand UFLI in kindergarten and explore additional literacy supports for grades 3–5. Elementary reading and mathematics proficiency remained generally consistent with previous years. Administration noted that District results were above Montana and national norms in both reading and mathematics. Discussion also addressed the difference between proficiency and growth and the importance of considering factors such as attendance, student mobility, and individual student starting points when evaluating academic performance. At the secondary level, administration reviewed middle

school mathematics data and ongoing curriculum work. The District is piloting Carnegie mathematics in grades 6–9 to strengthen curricular alignment between middle and high school. High school MAP, PreACT, and ACT data were also reviewed, including how the assessments can be used to monitor student progress toward ACT college-readiness benchmarks.

Administration reviewed recent changes to ACT scoring and reporting and noted that final District ACT results remained above the state average. The Committee also discussed the need to better connect Montana standards, District curriculum, and ACT expectations so teachers and students have a clearer understanding of college-readiness expectations. Trustees discussed the importance of providing continued growth opportunities for students who are already proficient. Trustees also requested that future academic reporting include attendance and student mobility data to provide additional context for student performance. Dr. Kaitlyn Hess, Data and Federal Programs Director, addressed questions from the Teaching and Learning Committee regarding the information presented.

VI. BOARD/SUPERINTENDENT COMMENTS

Superintendent Weltz noted that the District’s ACT college-readiness results compare favorably with state and national performance. The Board and Superintendent discussed educational funding and the connection between resources, staffing, teacher morale, and student achievement. Superintendent Weltz expressed optimism about the District’s academic direction, highlighting the PreK–3 focus and alignment of mathematics instruction from middle through high school. He emphasized the importance of documenting the District’s progress and maintaining a clear focus moving forward.

VII. ADJOURNMENT
